CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT- April 2024




2023-2024 ACC Book Discussions

Our church is entering a period where we will be making decisions. Many of these decisions will have significant impact on the future of our church. That's not a new thing for us. We've made lots of major decisions in the past few years. What's different now is that there's no big issue defining what we need to work on. Think about the past few years.

- Last year, we focused on financial problems. Working together, making tough decisions, working hard and then lots of generosity brought us to the place where we now have a good degree of financial stability.
- The pandemic dominated our planning and decisions for a couple of years before that. So many meetings and discussion about what to do, how to do it, and when. We got through this time without the kind of unpleasantness that disrupted many churches, and emerged from it as a strong, united church family.
- Just before the pandemic we were deciding on whom to call as our new pastor. We had a unanimous vote in our sanctuary where we decided to call Rev. Candi just before we closed the church for the pandemic.

Think, too, about the impact of all of the decisions we've made over the past several years.

This year there's no demanding issue (that I know of) dictating what we will be making decisions about and where we will be focusing our efforts. There's no driving issue dictating what we will discuss, decide about, plan for, and act on. Possibilities are percolating like the Villages Project, and bingo as a significant fund-raiser. There's major interest in the women's retreat. Decisions will be made about these, and other things, in the months ahead.

Whatever decisions we do make, whatever we set our hearts, minds, and hands to will have impact for many years to come. May the Lord guide our decision making and actions as our church moves onto new paths.

Restore the Foundation

3/15/2024



It is amazing what can be done when the People of God set their minds to a task and seek God's blessing. Financially we have turned the corner and are headed toward sustainability. Thank you for your generosity! We are grateful to have so many "angels" in our midst. Now it's time to continue in our Mission and set a course of action.

We will always be a Church that spends more than is pledged and collected. This is neither bad nor wrong. This is not unusual for a UCC church. We must keep a steady flow into our foundation, our endowment that is supporting our ability to continually move forward and fulfill God's Will.

Earlier, we had begun a campaign of the "10% Challenge," which we put on hold to focus on the \$50,000 Match Challenge. Several have already responded by updating their wills, trusts and life insurance policies. Others have pledged 10% of their assets to our church before their Estate is settled. I did it. It was easy! If we all do this, the flow to our foundation will have a great base.

Another way to increase the flow to our foundation is to redirect funds coming out of retirement programs and IRA's that have a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). By age 73, federal regulations require we start taking money out of our Traditional IRA's and retirement programs. For some this is not an income source that they need and it can present an income tax issue. With little effort those distributions can be directed to our church to help reduce their income taxes. This could become another steady flow to keep our base strong.

Finally, some of us have stocks or other assets we have held for a long time. If we cash them in there can be tax burdens. If those same assets are transferred to the church the tax burden can be reduced.

These are concepts, not a detailed explanation of what to do. As time and opportunity allows, we will seek ways to provide more detail and perhaps even support. Like the Blues Brothers said, "We are on a mission from God." Working together we can be more of what our Creator asks of us. What an amazing blessing that is! Your Stewardship Committee


